Three reasons Jesus didn't reply to questions

HOW TO THRIVE IN A HOSTILE ENVIRONMENT

Many are aware that the perception the public have of us, as Christians, is declining. Our negative stories are told, but not our positive. The way we are spoken about by media often carries a bias, and this affects public opinion. There is a growing hostility toward Christians, and sometimes even an assumption of intolerance.

But there is good news. Jesus lived in a hostile environment too! While we've often viewed Jesus through the lenses of our free culture, the reality is that he lived under a brutal Roman occupation, with religious leaders wanting to see him executed. Did the hostility mean he couldn't thrive or fulfil his mission? No!

However, the hostility did mean Jesus had to be wise. For example, he sometimes replied to questions with questions, or told stories, or stayed silent!

Three reasons Jesus didn't reply to questions

Hostile motive (...he investigated the motive or deflected)

When asked by what authority he did what he did (Matthew 21), Jesus could easily have replied to their question.
Were it his disciples asking, he might

have replied! However, he discerned their motives, and therefore replied with a question. 'Tell me, by what authority did John the Baptist do what he did? Answer my question and I'll answer yours!' He avoided answering their question!

Toxic topic (...he avoided a reply)

When asked about paying taxes to Caesar (Matthew 22), it was a toxic question and a trap. If he undermined Rome's authority, he could end up dead. Knowing their motive, he asked, 'Why are you trying to trap me?' He then deflected with profound wisdom, asking to see a coin, and then said, 'give to Caesar what is Caesars, and to God what is God's.'

Potential misunderstanding (...he avoided a reply)

When asked if he was the Messiah or Promised One, Jesus avoided replying because he knew they could not accept his reply. When demons cried out 'you are the Son of God' he told them to be silent for the same reason, as also on some occasions when he healed people (Like with the man healed of Leprosy in Mark 1.44, or with the family of the girl raised to life in Mark 5.43)

The Messiah was expected to be a military leader who would re-

establish God's Kingdom (Israel) by overthrowing the enemy (Rome). In contrast to this, Jesus had come as the 'suffering servant' to die for the sin of the world (Isaiah 53). He therefore declined to engage with these questions publicly — until at his trials. It is of note that when he finally did answer this question publicly in Matthew 26:63, it got him killed! (There is a time to speak — but it can be costly!)

Jesus thrived despite the cultural prejudices and misunderstandings — and so can we!

Jesus said, "I am sending you out like sheep among wolves. Therefore be as shrewd as snakes and as innocent as doves" (Matthew 10:16). We might be in an increasingly hostile environment, but that doesn't mean we can't thrive. It just means we need to adapt!

What are the toxic topics in our society? Regarding which conversations are the public primed to misunderstand us? Jesus engaged with the interested, intrigued the disinterested, and deflected the hostile. Let's learn from him!

While the prayer of John 17 seems on the surface to be a prayer for unity, it's more specifically about 'unity for mission'. Beyond being a prayer for believers, it was a prayer 'for those who would believe' through them (v20). The great hope of the prayer is that the world would believe (v21) — and the world would know (v23). Unity is not only about togetherness; it is about outreach!



Two types of unity

Philippians 1:27 talks about us 'standing firm in one Spirit...' and then, '...striving together as one...' for the faith of the gospel. Standing firm is maybe like our 'positional' unity. We have the same heavenly Father, we read the same Bible, and we serve on the same mission. We can be united without even meeting, and can quickly sense our unity when we do gather to pray or worship!

However, there is a second type of unity, and that is 'functional' unity — maybe like in the words '...striving together as one...'. God's desire is not only that we get on well and pray together; there are things we need to do!

One Church — not many

The Greek word for 'church' is ekklesia, and it simply means the gathering. Today, many use the word 'church' in two ways. Firstly, it is used in reference to individual gatherings of Christians, which we call a church. For example, "there is the Baptist one, the Elim one, and the Anglican one in our village". A small letter 'c' is often used for 'church' in this context.

The second way we use the word is in relation to God's united Church as a whole — which is 'Church' with a capital 'C'. This refers to everyone who loves Jesus in a place. There is only one Church in each city, and only one Church in our nation. Both the local church and the united Church are needed!

What unity isn't

Unity has sometimes been reduced to uniformity. We run a big event and think that is unity. Maybe we feel disappointed everyone didn't turn up — so we complain about disunity. But unity isn't uniformity! As Christian believers we are united whether we meet together or not. You could say that our larger combined church gatherings are 'extras' — though very good extras! God is surely pleased, just as a parent is when their children play well together. Psalm 139 certainly suggests this! These gatherings can also be very encouraging, and a part of our witness (John 13:35)!

But our gathering doesn't mean we're united — and we can be united without everyone gathering!

Why then might we need to come together in one place? The answer is principally in view of things we might be able to achieve together that we might not achieve apart! It's about 'functional' unity. There are things that need doing that require collaboration!



How many of us need to come together then? All of us, or just some? The answer is surely, 'enough'! Where a need or opportunity is identified, enough people need to come together to see the need met, or the opportunity enjoyed!



A key question for our unity

The primary purpose of our united efforts (beyond our worship and prayer) is therefore to enable outreach related things to happen that require more resources than one person or group can come up with by themselves.

To put it most simply. "What could we do together that we could not do apart?"

A second and more costly question for our unity

The second and more costly question is, "What could we do better together?" This is costly because the answer likely involves someone sacrificing something of 'their own' for the greater good. For example, three small youth groups combine and meet at one local church. That church is helped to grow because parents of teenagers start to attend there. Yet, if fruitfulness in our service is important, combining in various ways might be the right thing to do. What vision do we serve?

A third question for our unity — for church leaders

This question is a re-phrasing of the first question: "What can we **be** together that we cannot **be** apart?" The answer is that we can be the creators of a culture or environment in which our members are free to unite in their areas of interest and influence!

Consider the role of a pastor in a local church. Is it to be like the CEO who knows all that happens and leads it? Or might it be more about facilitating a culture or environment in which the members are free and released to become all they can be for God?

The same is true for various church leaders when they gather in a city or town. Pastors can create an environment amongst themselves, out of which their members are released to unite in their areas of influence and interest!

Put differently, this means functional unity is for church members, not only for church leaders! A role of church leaders when together in a city is to enable their members to unite like this, for the well-being of the whole community.

Capital 'C' Church leadership is different to small 'c' church leadership

For context, all church leadership is about a servant model of leadership, not a power model. With that noted, the way that leadership works in the local church and united Church is different. While we have authority to prayerfully appoint local pastors/



leaders in a local church, most agree that we don't have the same authority to appoint capital 'C' Church leaders (Ephesians 4) who might lead something in the Church as a whole in a city or the nation. Capital 'C" Church leadership is discerned, not appointed! People sometimes feel a personal sense of calling to do something for the Lord. Sometimes what they feel to do is in service to the interests of the Church as a whole in a city or nation. Every believer gets to discern for themselves whether they believe this person or thing is from God, and to then support if they believe it is. Different people might discern and support different things — and God can be behind this, to enable many things to co-exist! The way united Church leadership works is as simple as that!

The easiest parallel for the New Testament paradigm is to look at the Book of Judges in the Old Testament. Israel was given authority to appoint leaders in cities and tribes, but not over the nation. God didn't want them to have a king! Instead, he was their King. He would then raise up Judges when needed to lead the nation. The stories of Gideon, Deborah, Samson, Ehud and Jephthah are the result.

To put this differently, God will raise up different people at different times for different things. The way our various churches interpret key words like those found in Ephesians 4 does differ. However, discussion across the nation has proven that nearly all seem to be united in the idea contained in the above sentence in italics which is plausibly the real point! God can raise people up to serve the interests of the Church as a whole in various areas — and we need to be discerning.

God's Church — without hierarchy, is changing the world!


What's most remarkable is that this very organic, and nonstructured, leadership system God has given the Church as a whole is working! The Christian Church was 120 people in an upper room, and then 3000. It is said that 1/360 people were Christian by AD100, 1/11 people by AD1900 and about 1/7 people today.

The followers of Jesus can also be rightly recognised as having brought many amazing blessings to our society — including beliefs in human value and freedom, equality of genders, an end to slavery and a belief in the equality of races, ideas of human rights, education and healthcare for all, concepts of charity and a lot more. The Church, as a whole, is a huge success story!



A key to increased freedom in our unity

How then has the united Church worked despite its lack of formal structure? The answer is, because we have shared beliefs as found in the Word of God, while also each being led by the Holy



Spirit! However, a lot could go wrong with this and divide us — and this is why clear boundaries are so important!

In our cultural context, the below two boundaries seem to be making sense to a lot of people.

Boundary #1: There is nothing wrong with independence

This boundary is implied by the goal: 'What could we do together that we couldn't do apart?' There is nothing wrong with doing things apart! In fact, it's good that we do!

Boundary #2: We don't all have to

This is the key boundary — and our breaking of it the main reason 'unity things' become difficult. 'We don't all have to', means that no one gets to tell anyone else what to do — or to even imply 'they should'! If leadership in the wider Church is discerned, each person therefore gets to discern who and what they will and will not partner with, without being judged for it!

It could also be true that God might enable three churches to discern a particular thing as important, while different five churches discern a different thing. What if we discern things differently because God is leading us differently? What if it really is God who is leading us, and he has provided enough people to come together to enable each thing?

These boundaries create health and freedom in the unity space without need for judgement of others, coercion or pressure. The result is an environment conducive for increased collaboration and innovation — and that is the point!

An increased capacity — Part I: The releasing of members

Imagine 10 different ministry initiatives that could bless a city, yet that each needed specialist skills that go beyond the abilities of one congregation. Where individual churches could not achieve these, the collaboration of individuals from those churches could!

The capacity of a church's members to bring leadership goes far further than what might be applied in the context of their local church. What if we could 'let' our members deploy their leadership energies in service to our communities to a greater degree — in collaboration with others? Some are waiting for permission.

To consider the scope, some might be suited to engage with education, others with council, others with various combined city-level events in key seasons, others with lwi, others amongst youth groups together, others between Sunday schools together, others between church worship teams together, others with the homeless, others supporting young mums with unexpected pregnancies, others redistributing excess food to those in need, others with those struggling with various addictions — and more.

So it is noted, this kind of collaboration and effort is already happening in numerous places, with multiple initiatives existing that are 'owned amongst God's people' — rather than by any one individual congregation. Tauranga and Te Puke are two examples, among many. Both places have various ministries 'for the city', run by people who are united in a vision, yet who attend various different congregations on a Sunday. It releases a new level of capacity from amongst us!

An increased capacity — Part II: The profound simplicity and effect of 'in unison' strategies

Imagine a challenge we face in common as churches. The challenge to engaging in Christian witnessing in an environment that is increasingly hostile toward the Christian faith might be an

example. How could we help church members to engage more confidently, nationally?

What if 1500 churches united in a shared vison to equip their members with 'the conversational skills of Jesus' through an annual pulpit and small group series on this topic? To consider the simplicity of this — each church could do it their own way. There is no need for uniformity or centralised control. This could be achieved simply by bringing intentionality to the pulpit, small group, and youth group discussion. No more work is required — just intentionality, and it could enable a nationally united goal to be achieved!

So it is noted, it's possible that as many as 1000 churches are already united in this particular goal across our nation — while each pursuing it their own way! 15 similar ideas have also been in discussion in many city and town pastors' groups — which the next article lists.

OUR UNITY CAN WORK TO DELIVER RESULTS!

In summary

- There are things we can do together that we cannot do apart.
- Our combined capacity is probably larger than we think it is.
- While we are probably already more united than we think we are, might it also be possible that our unity is even more important than we think it is?
- As the world gets darker, our light needs to shine brighter (Matthew 5:15-16).
- Our unity is a key to this!
- Let's keep this journey going by talking about it!





What if in 20 years...

- 1. Our core messages were still being heard - despite cultural hostilities
- 2. Our members were better equipped to engage difficult conversations confidently
- 3. Our members were engaging with increased cultural wisdom, knowledge and story
- 4. The Church as a whole was stronger in prayer?

These are worthy goals, and here are some ways we could achieve them together without requiring uniformity, or even a whole lot of work!

How could we work 'in unison' — yet in our own way, to achieve these things?

GOAL #1. TO HAVE OUR CORE MESSAGES STILL HEARD



Protect key seasons: What if we united in simple efforts to keep Christ visible in the public square in Easter and Christmas? The freedoms of speech and religion are a matter of 'use it or lose it'. Creativity is a bridge. We can protect platforms for our hope and faith-filled messages together.

Examples: Combined events in cities and towns, Hope Project Christmas and Easter, Christmas floats, Nativity displays at Christmas, Christmas dramas in schools, etc.

Deliberately sharing Christian messages: What if we were all intentional to initiate or support efforts purposed to keep Christian messages visible in the public square, whether through web-media, TV, literature or events. Wisdom is needed — but a lot can be said by someone who has tact! The hearing of these messages protects our freedom to speak them!

Examples: Wisely worded messages at all possible Christian-run events and programmes, noting Light Parties and children's carnivals, plus messages on Christian TV, Christian Radio, Public TV programmes for public audiences like Life TV, combined billboard / web efforts, etc. Where could we say something sensitively and wisely - yet clearly?

There are various topics of conversation that are increasingly difficult to engage with in our nation. Basic Christian witness can be difficult. A useful area for learning is 'the conversational skills of Jesus'. What if we united to see the following:

- Conversational outreach training in every pulpit, every year.
- ii. Conversational outreach training in every small group, every year.
- iii. Conversational outreach training in every youth ministry, every year.

The freedom of information precedes the freedom of conscience. Put differently, if people don't have access to both sides of a matter, they cannot discern what is true. When public media becomes increasingly one-sided, we have a 'freedom of information' problem. Giving people access to information is important — but, as another point, so is a knowledge of history! Where freedoms are lost, increasing care is needed with words. Making quotable statements can become unwise. How could a person express a point without making a statement? The answer is, by telling a story! Jesus said to be 'as wise as serpents, yet as harmless as doves' (Matthew 10:16). We are blessed in Aotearoa-New Zealand with a history that is full of amazing stories. Story-telling from history is an approach that can work on all public platforms!

- i. Access to a balance of news: Let's encourage our members to be aware of news feeds that can give a balance of information on some topics, like Family First, New Zealand Christian Network, or similar.
- Apologetics conferences: Let's support apologetics conferences run in various parts of our nation — like by Thinking Matters. These create a platform from which thinking individuals can be heard, which lifts us all.
- **Pulpits:** What if we all also preached on a current issue from our pulpits maybe three times per year — though wisely, while connecting members to sources of information they can investigate? (Better to teach a man to fish than to only give him a fish).
- New media platforms: Our nation has many people attempting to speak up for conservative perspectives and values. What we lack is platforms from which they can be heard. Let's be ready to support new innovations in this area.
- Bicultural history: Let's all read, research, write and tell history stories related to the influence of Christian faith in our bicultural history. It is profound and influences perspectives of our faith.
- vi. Values history: Let's likewise learn and talk about where our amazing cultural values came from — as these stories are powerful, and Christianity is central to the story!

A potential to consider

Because these ideas can be applied by each church its own way, this doesn't offend our individuality.

Because these ideas can be applied through what we already do, by becoming more intentional, this doesn't need to make us any more busy!

Churches could therefore potentially embrace ALL of these ideas — their own way!

Additionally, if 1000 churches did this (which is plausible), we could generate a broad effect together.

We estimate that anywhere from 200 to over 1000 churches might be applying each of these ideas already — which is very encouraging.*

HOW ABOUT IT?

 * One of the lowest might be the number of churches that preach on current societal topics and issues related to the wellbeing of people. Our data and networking suggests that a goal like 'conversational outreach equipping through pulpits' is reaching a point of broad acceptance, now promoted through various church networks. As another example, the bicultural value took the same journey in just the past decade, resulting in new thinking, innovation and initiative across the nation as a result.

Connection precedes collaboration

Before ideas like those in the prior article can be embraced, they must be heard. Networks can come about that share ideas in a broad way. The most sensible or timely ideas then rise to the surface, and are embraced by many.

Please connect through our monthly e-updates

We network nationally, and these e-updates, combined with meetings with gatherings of church leaders in cities and towns across the nation, enable communication lines regarding a range of unity and outreach things. This includes promotion of the work of about 20 organisations and individuals by various means — though only in relation to unity and outreach.

Without communication lines, collaboration amongst many is not possible.

If you can feel a growing prejudice against the Christian faith in our nation as an adult, can you imagine what this might be like for our youth? Times are changing, youth leadership really is harder, and adaption is needed.

One thing youth leaders can do, that is known to help, is to unite with other youth leaders in their city or town. It doesn't take long to see how the support and teamwork this enables can make a difference, including to their outreach!

Here are four good things that can come from youth leaders uniting:

- The leaders last longer because they have an extra support network from amongst their own peers
- **2.** Youth are equipped to engage Youth leaders can work together to ensure all their youth are equipped in conversational skills for their witness (including for hostile environments — noting free resources exist for this)

- 3. Youth are encouraged to unite so they are strengthened Leaders can agree to encourage their youth to unite as one, to pray together in their schools
- **Larger youth events** Together, youth groups can run a few larger events, to gather a crowd and add momentum to other personal and youth group outreaching efforts.

What if we all encouraged or helped to enable this?

"Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labour. For if one falls down, his companion can lift him up; but pity the one who falls without another to help him up!" - Ecclesiastes 4:9-10


What does a 601% increase in link clicks tell us?

For one highlight from our data, we had a 601% increase in 'link clicks' in our public social media last Easter. A 'link click' is the one thing a person can do invisibly — as contrasted to a share, 'like' or comment. People are interested to know more!

This represents a pattern that a few churches and Christian ministries have been noticing in their web data the past 2 years.



BOOKLET HELPING OUTREACH IN MANY PLACES



She said she hadn't been to church in a long time - but was going to go back. "The booklet in the post has made me think and I want to change and refocus on God!"



Who says human life is valuable?

Our cultural ideas about human rights are based on the Biblical idea that people are created special (in the image of God', Genesis 1:27). It is this idea and value in our history that paved the path for the freedoms, equality, charity and prosperity we enjoy today. But what happens if you cut the root of the tree?

Discomfort: Standing in defence of the rights and wellbeing of others is highly inconvenient. Jesus faced this challenge with the religious leaders. Their abuses of power were hurting the people. Protecting and helping the vulnerable is an obligation of love. As Jesus put it in the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats, "It tell you, whatever you did for the least of these, you did for me" (Matthew 25).

Discernment and knowledge: However, it is also true that we can only protect what we first understand. Without knowledge, we might discern something incorrectly, and act foolishly.

Application: One aspect of that knowledge is a knowledge of our own cultural history. Have you ever considered the Biblical and historical basis for our cultural views on human rights?

Some simple resources that could help

- It was with intent that the previous four 'Hope For All' booklets deliberately covered six areas in which the Christian faith gave our nation its values.
- Small group discussion guides have been created to go with each topic - considering both the Biblical and historical basis of these values in our nation.
- The 2021 booklet, 'Hope For All Now Made Free' was specifically about the history of our cultural views on 'Human rights and freedoms'. What if we all did this study — and then maybe even read a book?




